Highlights from 1956...

Chevy called its '55 "The Hot One." Ads said the '56 was even hotter. It was. The old Stovebolt, now offered with manual shift only, was up to 140 bhp, while the V-8 delivered up to 225 bhp with Power-Pak. A \$40-million restyle made all models look more like Cadillacs, and four-door hardtop Sport Sedans joined the Two-Ten and Bel Air lines. Chevy had record market penetration of close to 28 percent – about 1.5 million units compared to Ford at around 1.4 million. Ford's '56 line featured more potent engines and two new models: a Customline Victoria and the division's first four-door hardtop, the Fairlane Town Victoria. Ford also began selling "Lifeguard Design" safety features, equipping all models with dished steering wheels, breakaway rearview mirror, and crash proof door locks, padded dash. Sun visors cost \$16 extra, factory-installed seatbelts \$9. The rush to seatbelts overtaxed Ford's supplier, so only 20 percent of the '56's got them.
